



GUATEMALA TEAM COMPOSITION GUIDE

General guidelines for putting together a successful team

We welcome groups of all ages. However, we ask that all teams take into consideration the following guidelines when compiling a team. These guidelines will help ensure that your group is equipped to complete the project in the specified amount of time.

15-25 Workers

The term “workers” indicates an individual age 12 or older that can be counted on to work the entire duration of the project. Children age 11 and under and those responsible for childcare should not be counted as workers. This does not mean that they are not able to join in the building process; however, they should not be counted when evaluating whether or not your team has enough members for a project.

We strongly urge that you stay within the boundaries of the specified group numbers. With more than two decades of experience, we have learned that these numbers work best.

Too Few

Teams with fewer than the recommended number will have a difficult time completing the project. It will also place greater physical demands on each of the participants.

Too Many

For teams with more than the recommended number, there will not be enough work to keep everyone busy for the duration of the project.

Youth Teams

It is our strong recommendation that all youth teams have one adult per 3-4 students. We urge these teams to aim for the higher end of the recommended group sizes.

Children

It is the desire of Casas por Cristo to allow families the opportunity to serve together in Guatemala. We do not have a policy against bringing children on a Casas mission trip. However, there are some variables that need to be considered.

- We consider a child to be anyone under the age of 12. Children should not be counted in your “worker” count. If there are children on the work site, it will be the responsibility of an adult to supervise them. Additionally, this adult caregiver should not be counted as a worker. There will be some jobs that the children are more than welcome to join in and help on. However, these jobs will also require some adult supervision and guidance.
- As with any participant in a foreign mission trip, there are risk factors involved. It is extremely important that no child be unsupervised at any time. As with every team member, under no circumstances should a child play with the animals. They will also need to be monitored so that they do not drink the water. Please bring the name and phone number of their pediatrician and/or doctors in the event that an emergency arises.

The Terrain

Keep in mind when planning your trip that the city of San Raymundo, Guatemala is a mountain town. The areas around San Raymundo are mountainous and hilly. Some of our building sites have the potential for lots of up and down walking or hiking just to get to the building location. While not all of the locations are like this, some are. This trip should definitely be considered an adventurous mission trip.
